


# FESTIVAL REGISTRATION AND EVENT HEADQUARTERS

#### FIFLD TRIP

"BEGINNING BIRDING IN THE FIELD" Thursday, May 17th, 5:30 pm – 7:00 pm Cost \$10.00

This field trip is guaranteed to kick-start your spring bird identification skills, binocular handling and birding basics instruction, serving as a handy refresher for experienced birders, too. Walk with birding experts at Dunton Locks County Park on the edge of Detroit Lakes. You'll wander through mature hardwoods and trek along the edges of a lake. There's plenty of habitat for a diversity of birds. Transportation is on your own. Maps will be available at registration or arrive early for a 5:00 pm departure to car pool or caravan with other participants from the Minnesota State Community and Technical College.

#### **EVENING FIELDTRIP**

"AN EVENING WITH WOODCOCK"
Thursday, May 17th, 7:45 pm –10:00 pm
Cost \$10.00

The evening will begin with a special program on the natural history and unique breeding habits of woodcock and prepare you to hear the calls of these elusive birds. We'll then break up into small groups and car pool to various sites on a wildlife refuge to search for these birds. We may also catch a glance of a few local owls. Dark colored outer clothing is required. Meet at the Tamarac National Wildlife Refuge visitor center located 18 miles northeast of Detroit Lakes at the junction of Hwy 29 & Hwy 26. Please arrive at 7:45 pm sharp. Transportation is on your own, maps will be available.

"AGASSIZ NATIONAL WILDLIFF REFUGE"

Middle River, MN

Friday, May 18, 5:30 am- 2:00 pm

Cost: \$30.00, sack lunch included

New field-trip site in 2007! Area birding experts will guide you through this 61,500 acre Globally Important Bird Area and one of the 100 best birding sites in North America. Agassiz is a complex refuge featuring 15 different habitat types attracting 287 species of birds. We'll be looking for Black-crowned Night Herons, Le Conte's & Nelson's Sharp-tailed Sparrows, 5 species of grebes, 17 species of nesting waterfowl, Black-billed Magpie, Sandhill Cranes, American Bitterns and more! This trip is approximately a two hour drive to reach the refuge and well worth the anticipation. You won't see a more productive, diverse breeding bird area in the region.

#### FRIDAY - MAY 18

"BLUESTEM PRAIRIE & BUFFALO RIVER STATE PARK" Friday, May 18, 5:45 am- 2:00 pm

Cost \$30.00, sack lunch included

The first stop will be Buffalo River State Park which contains over 1.300 acres of prairie and hardwood riverine habitats. There are hiking trails and a nearby interpretive center, Biologist Greg Hoch from Concordia College will demonstrate bird banding using mist nets. As birds are caught you'll get a hands-on look at how to extract birds from the net, hold/release birds, and banding techniques. Hoch will also give a crash course on aging birds by their feathers. Then tromp over to the adjacent Nature Conservancy's Bluestem Prairie which is 4,600 acres of more than 300 species of plants and 70 species of birds. This tract contains some of the best mesic prairie left in the state. Birds to look for on this trip include Upland Sandpiper, Bobolink, grassland sparrows including Henslow's, Meadowlark, Marbled Godwit and the Blue-gray Gnatcatcher.

Maplelag Resort & Conference Center is located on Little Sugarbush Lake, 20 miles NE of Detroit Lakes. The name is derived from the 600 acres of sugar maple trees and "lag," (pronounced log) which is Norwegian for group or gathering. Maplelag is a destination cross country ski resort in the winter and for 11 weeks in the summer hosts a language village. This rural getaway for vacationers and business gatherings has eclectic collections that include depot signs and metal lunch boxes. Their foods are prepared from scratch using the finest ingredients. Our meal will be served family style and includes Pan Fried Walleye, Wild Rice, Fried Potatoes, Cucumber Salad, Bread, Lemon Meringue Pie, coffee, water, tea and milk.

Along with dinner you will be introduced to landscaping with native woodland species by Ron Bowen, President of Prairie Restorations, Inc. Bowen founded this business in 1977 that is dedicated to the production and use of native plants and plant communities. Prairie Restorations, Inc. has successfully collected "local ecotypes" (native seed) of the primary prairie species and has expanded into woodland species. Through the company thousands of acres of prairie, woodland, and wetlands have been restored and hundreds of projects have been completed throughout the Midwest. Ron was the 1998 recipient of the Land Stewardship Award from the Minnesota Chapter of The Nature Conservancy.

"BIRDING WITH DAVID ALLEN SIBLEY" Saturday, May 19, 5:30 am-11:30 am Cost \$75.00

Here's a chance of a lifetime to go birding with the field-guide author David Allen Sibley! You'll visit two national wildlife refuges and a variety of habitats. The 3400 acre Hamden Slough refuge has been designated as an Important Bird Area by Audubon Society of Minnesota. It truly is a treasure, with restored tallgrass prairies and wetlands attracting many unusual species. Highlights are American Bittern, 20 waterfowl species, Swainson's hawk, over 20 shorebird species, Sedge and Marsh Wrens, prairie sparrows and Bobolink. Our 2007 theme bird, Wilson's Phalarope makes their home at Hamden Slough. A trek to Tamarac National Wildlife Refuge will reveal the wonders of the woodlands in North Country. From hardwood oaks to red and white pines through tamarack bogs, this dramatic change in landscape will bring yet another plethera of bird life. You'll see nesting Bald Eagles, Trumpeter Swans and Common Loons. Interesting bird species found here include Red-necked Grebe, Winter Wren, Ruffed Grouse, American Woodcock, Scarlet Tanager, Indigo Bunting, Eastern Towhee, Vireos and over 24 warbler species. Refuge Managers Barbara Boyle and Mike Murphy have an enthusiasm for these precious habitats that will keep you on your toes.

#### SATURDAY - MAY 20

"ROTHSAY PRAIRIE COMPLEX" Saturday, May 19, 5:45 am- 11:30 am Cost \$25.00

Rothsay lies just east of the beachline of glacial Lake Agassiz and features unique habitats. Primarily prairie, wet meadow, field and woodlots will accent this trip which can reveal upwards of 100 species. Interesting birds found here include Greater Prairie Chicken, Marbled Godwit, Short Eared Owl, prairie sparrows such as Vesper, Savannah and LeConte's, both Alder and Willow Flycatchers, Northern Harrier, and a variety of dabbling ducks. You'll be amazed at the diversity of species in this thriving tall-grass mecca. Fieldtrip leaders will help you spy the array of sparrows and sandpipers through scopes. This trip is a 'must do' for those wanting to practice their identification skills of our little brown feathered friends.

"TAMARAC NATIONAL WILDLIFE REFUGE" Saturday, May 19, 6:00 am- 11:30 am Cost \$25.00

Just 18 miles from Detroit Lakes, this nearly 43,000 acre refuge is a premier bird refuge of Northwestern Minnesota. A mosaic of habitats includes pine and hardwood forests, lakes, rivers, marshes and brushy grasslands. Tamarac's wildlife biologist Wayne Brininger will lead us to the best areas for spotting interesting bird species including Red-necked Grebe, Least Bittern, American Woodcock, Winter Wren, Scarlet Tanager, Indigo Bunting, Eastern Towhee, Vireos and over 24 warbler species. You'll see Bald Eagles, Common Loons and Trumpeter Swans nesting. A stop will be made at the visitor center to capture a few more species on the busy bird feeders and explore the natural history exhibits. The refuge has a bird list of 258 species, so there will be plenty of feathered friends to see here.



While you're in northwestern Minnesota, plan to spend a few extra days to check out the Pine to Prairie Birding Trail! This 230 mile long trail offers tremendous birding opportunities through transitional habitats. Pine forests, deciduous woodlands, native tallgrass prairie, aspen parkland, sand dunes (remnants of Glacial Lake Agassiz), calcareous fens, bogs, marshes, large and small lakes and rivers that provide riparian habitat are all found along the trail.



The trail runs from Warroad to Roseau, Thief River Falls, Detroit Lakes, Pelican Rapids, and Fergus Falls. The trail's checklist includes 275 regular and

26 casual species. A copy of the trail guide book will be included in your welcome packet.

#### **GENERAL INFORMATION**

#### Weather & Attire

Northern Minnesota weather is highly variable during the spring months. Temperatures usually range from the 70's to the 40's. If it's windy, it can seem much colder. We suggest that for field trips you bring jackets for both warm and cold weather that you can layer, along with hats, gloves and waterproof outerwear. Waterproof footgear is also recommended for field trips, as dew may be heavy in the mornings. No field trips will be canceled unless weather is severe. Refunds will not be given for field trip cancellations due to weather conditions.

Feel free to dress in casual attire for all festival events.

#### Fieldtrip Notes

Most events will be held at the Minnesota State Community and Technical College in Detroit Lakes, located on Highway 34. With the exception of evening events, all trips will be via coach buses with onboard restrooms, fieldtrip leaders and a naturalist. Granola bars and water will be provided on all trips. Several trips also include a sack lunch, as noted in the trip description, which includes a sandwich, snack bag of chips, fruit/veggie and bar or cookie.

Many of the fieldtrips involve a considerable amount of walking. Please notify the trip leader if you have limited mobility or a health condition that limits the distance you are able to walk. We are committed to providing an enjoyable and safe experience. Space may be limited on some field trips so register early! Please be on time. Buses leave at the times noted from the parking lot of the College. Return times may fluctuate slightly from the stated time, especially if bird sightings are exceptional on the fieldtrip. We kindly request that personal vehicles not caravan behind the buses on field trips. If you need to leave Detroit Lakes early on Sunday, please plan accordingly. Coffee, fruit and pastries will be available Friday, Saturday and Sunday morning at the Bird Café, with proceeds benefiting the local Lakes Area Bird Club.


#### **Silent Auction**

"ITASCA STATE PARK"

Sunday, May 20, 5:30 am - 2:00 pm Cost: \$30.00, sack lunch included

Along with towering red and white pines, lakes and bogs, Itasca hosts an impressive variety of bird life. A total of 109 species were seen in past years, including Pileated Woodpecker: Alder, Least and Great Crested Flycatchers; Winter Wren; Scarlet Tanager; Evening Grosbeak and 21 warbler species. This trip also offers a chance to see the elusive Black-backed Woodpecker, which was sighted in 2006! Itasca is Minnesota's oldest state park and home to the headwaters of the Mississippi River. This is the optimum time for a spectacular display of large-flowered trillium and other woodland wildflowers. We'll eat lunch at the Jacob V. Brower Visitor Center, which you'll have a chance to briefly tour.

"FELTON. ULEN and HELLIKSEN PRAIRIES" Sunday, May 20, 5:45 am - 2:00 pm Cost \$30.00. sack lunch included

The area around Felton and Ulen offers a unique collection of virgin grasslands and wet meadows in Clay County. Helliksen is a Waterfowl Production Area managed by the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service. These areas boast a variety of prairie species, some rarely seen elsewhere in Minnesota. This is the only known breeding area for the Chestnut-collared Longspur in the state. Last year revealed 110 species on this trip. Highlights have been Greater Prairie Chicken, Upland Sandpiper, Marbled Godwit, Sanderling, Olive-sided Flycatcher, Loggerhead Shrike, Sedge Wren, Rock Wren, Swainson's Thrush, a variety of warblers, Baltimore and Orchard Orioles. Join manager, Scott Kahan from the Detroit Lakes Wetlands Management District and immerse yourself in these rich prairie potholes.

#### Registration

Our pre-registration deadline is **Friday, May 11th**. On-site registration will be available at the Minnesota State Community and Technical College, however, early registration is strongly recommended as fieldtrips and workshops are limited. Register by Friday, April 27th to be included in the special 'Early Bird Drawing' for a pair of binoculars from Eagle Optics!

#### Cancellation Policy & Special Terms:

Cancellations must be made no later than 4:00 pm, May 11, 2007. The registration fee is non-refundable. Purchase of additional fieldtrip or workshop tickets can be made on-site, upon availability.

If you would like a Detroit Lakes lodging and attractions guide, bird checklists, maps, etc. mailed to you with your registration confirmation letter, please indicate this on your registration form. These items will be available at the festival.

#### Registration Booth

The registration booth will be located in the lobby of the Minnesota State Community and Technical College, located on Highway 34. Since Roosevelt Avenue will be under construction in 2007. we suggest this alternate route: Turn north off of Highway 10 at the Washington Avenue stoplight corner. Travel six blocks and turn east (right) onto Highway 34. The Technical College is located one block past the stop lights.

When you arrive, please check-in to receive your information packet complete with maps, tickets, bird checklists and an event schedule. Look inside your welcome packet for merchant discounts and sponsor gifts. Volunteers will be available to help you with questions. 
